Post-natal care for mother and child remain in demand.


And, we are seeing a merciful decrease in infant mortality rates!

As the only reliable medical provider for 250,000 people, Hôpital Sacré Coeur places tremendous emphasis on public health education and preventative care. In 2008, the Community Health Department experienced unprecedented growth with a 45% increase in patient visits. Secondary school programs on pregnancy, HIV/AIDS, and sexual behavior received wide acceptance. A new Family Life Center offering innovative and effective Natural Family Planning grew beyond our wildest dreams in its first year and demand for its services continues at a exponential rate. Expanding the Vision for . . .

In 2008, retired international building contractor, Tim Traynor, volunteered his considerable talents to conduct a year long needs assessment study of the hospital campus. In exacting detail, Tim outlined a multi-years process of working with the Haitian staff to renovate and restructure the buildings and facilities. A core element of Tim's plan includes the hands on education and training of Hôpital

Sacré Coeur's maintenance staff to elevate their skill levels to those of top U.S. trades people. In May 2009, U.S. volunteers joined with Haitians for the first project: interior and exterior

painting of all the buildings. The larger plan calls for the expansion of maternity services, construction of an Emergency Room, a staff training facility, expanded Operating Room suite and other

major renovations. When complete, HSC will serve even more Haitians with top quality medical care.





In 2000, retired University of Kentucky Laboratory Sciences Chair, Sister Marie Vittetoe arrived at Hôpital Sacré Coeur. She told the staff, "If you do everything I tell you, you will have the best little lab in all of Haiti." In partnership with nine eager lab students and hospital administration, Sr. Marie expanded the once tiny facility into a full service lab and trained her students to become top notch lab technicians. Today, HSC's lab serves the area wide medical community and stands out as one of the highest quality labs in the country.



Last year Sr. Marie retired (again!) at age 83. The lab staff crayoned their thanks to this remarkable woman, on

their daily work board. Months later, it has not been erased!





Transforming Spaces . . .

Pediatrics unit emitted an overpowering odor that dominated the side yard. A week of work by staff and volunteers combined with less than \$100 of materials was all that was needed to remove the structure, stabilize the area and stem a source of potential disease.



The openings were sealed, topsoil laid, and a small garden designed. Some staff added shrubs and flowers. Another gifted staff member created a stunning Creole Madonna out of fired, native red clay. Her message: "Beni Timoun Yo." or "Bless the Children." Today, families congregate here for comfort, solace and prayer.



Upgrading for Expanded Service . . .

A large part of our effectiveness as a major agent of change in Haiti is our ability to adapt to changing environments with innovation and nimbleness. In 2008, thanks to our donors, we replaced outmoded generators with three more efficient models and endured four hurricanes without power disruption. A safer cistern took the place of a dangerously eroded one. A recycled and refurbished ambulance marked the start of better access to emergency care. New ultrasounds and OB-GYN equipment promise even greater reductions in infant mortality. A new medical library opened and more storage

space and shelving were added.

Freeing Hands For Tasks . . .



Not long ago, clothes lines replaced the drying of laundry on the grass. But, frequent rainstorms showed the limits of this progressive step as 600 sheets at a time went to Cap Haitien for drying.

Transforming Places . . .



In Haiti, patient care is a family endeavor. Patients arrive at Hôpital Sacré Coeur in the company of many concerned and caring family members who stay for the duration of the hospital visit. Rapid growth in the patient and family populations overwhelmed the community latrine. In April, 2008, a much needed modern facility opened for use. Designed in accordance with UNICEF guidelines, the new latrine serves 1500 people, Monday through Friday, from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. A permanent staff attendant ensures that the facility stays invitingly clean and well maintained.
